



The Donald Simpson Community Centre is now powered by its own solar panels. The photos below show a one-day reading of 80.79 Kilowatt Hours which is near enough to covering our daily usage. The bottom photo shows the total of 6.47 Megawatt Hours produced since the panels were activated in January.

It is anticipated that our system will considerably reduce our electricity bill giving us additional funds to operate the Centre. It is premature to say at this stage what the figures will show but members will be kept informed as information becomes available via our electricity accounts.

Our Generous Sponsors

One of the strategies on which we embarked last year was to invite local businesses to sponsor the Centre. This program has the potential to provide us with funds and to allow appropriate local businesses access to a market of our members in which to display their services.

As members will see on our internal TV screens, the display board at the entrance to the Centre and in this newsletter, we have a number of businesses which have opted to pay us to sponsor the Centre.

If this program continues, it will contribute funding to replace the operational funding which the Council has reduced in the current financial year and which it will totally cease to provide from 1 July 2018.

The sponsorship program is not a one-sided affair. Our members will decide whether we will retain sponsors and continue the program by giving sponsors the opportunity to bid for their services. Sponsorships operate as a benevolent form of advertising. Rather than purchasing TV, billboard or newspaper space, a sponsor provides funding to an entity (profit or non-profit), non-profit in our case, to assist our operation and in return members can repay the sponsor by including them in the active quotes they obtain for products or services

Members do not have to guarantee that they will purchase from the sponsor. Sponsors are given the opportunity to display their wares in the usual way and take their chances with the sale just as they do with their other contacts and advertising.

Members can help the Centre to augment its funds by remembering to check our list of sponsors and seek quotes for services from them. If we can develop a harmonious relationship with our sponsors in this way, we will be displaying the working of a true community where businesses provide their support and we, in return, support local businesses.

From the Chair

Another year stretches before us bringing the anticipation of new experiences and the uncertainty of what these experiences will be.

At the Donald Simpson Centre, there is certainly a feeling of how certain initiatives will develop and how some other developments will hit where it hurts.

Our lead article refers to potential savings from a new solar array on the roof of the Centre. This has been, and continues to be, a nightmare of regulations which detract somewhat from a development which will assist in the financial viability of the Centre.

There is also the pleasure of seeing our members return to the enjoyment of their activities and social contacts for one more year. New activities will contribute to this enjoyment for some while the only activity which will not immediately continue is our information talks which have not attracted sufficient interest to justify bringing busy presenters to the Centre. The almost full-time use of our auditorium prevents our pursuit of continuing these talks as bigger events because we cannot find the space.

We are currently examining our future prospects which is a continuing exercise for a not-for-profit venture. With the small increase in activity fees, electricity savings from use of solar energy, much trimming of costs and the \$25,000 provided by the Department of Communities, we are financially sound for at least a couple of years.

We are unable to be complacent as there are emerging costs which have to be met and we need the revenue to cope.

Recently, the Board had to find \$10,000 to put with another \$10,000 it had put aside to replace the auditorium stage curtains. The Council had promised to help out with \$10,000 but their internal financial arrangements led them to withhold the payment. The urgency is that we were advised over a year ago that the present curtains are not compliant with fire safety and are a fire risk. The Board felt that it could not responsibly delay this replacement any longer. We could not risk the pain of having regrets if an accident did occur.

In looking at our future needs, the Board has also retained an architect to draw up plans for renovation of the Centre to cater for our growing future needs. Members will see this when the Board has obtained a final plan.

Members can help, as can their families and friends who may be future users of the Centre or sympathetic to our needs in a number of ways. The front-page article on sponsors suggests one of these ways with regard to acknowledging our generous sponsors. Encouraging new members, supporting our events and maintaining your participation in Centre activities is helpful.

One other way that we have always been reticent to mention for obvious reasons is for those who can manage to make donations or bequests to the Centre.

In all these ways and with hard work and clear thinking by the Board our Centre can continue to grow and prosper.



Some advice on scams from the Homepage of the ABC.

Why you should never trust a call from an unknown number and other tips for identifying scams

Have you been getting missed calls from overseas numbers or people pretending to be from Centrelink or the Australian Taxation Office?

These are just some examples of common phone scams that have occurred over the past few months, which have conned many Aussies into parting with their hard-earned cash.

Here's what you should do if you think a phone call sounds like a scam.

Almost 40 per cent of scams in Australia committed over the phone

Yep, according to Scamwatch, phone calls are the most popular for scammers in Australia.

That's followed by email at 26.5 per cent and text messaging at 15 per cent.



"[Phone calls are] so easy, it's very cheap and in countries where labour is cheaper, you've got whole call centres devoted to doing these sort of scam calls and I think that personal touch gives them a greater likelihood of getting more victims," Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) deputy chairwoman Delia Rickard said.

Anyone can be targeted

Scammers target indiscriminately — no matter your age, income level or background.

Lately, an international scam dubbed "wangiri fraud," roughly translated to mean one ring, has seen scammers use phone numbers, possibly bought legally or on the dark web, to dial phone users in other countries. They usually disconnect the call after a few rings, hoping you will call them back.

ACCC's Scamwatch said they had 277 reports last week about the scam — which was a 794 per cent increase.

But it's not the only one. Scamwatch also said they had received complaints about scammers pretending to be from Centrelink or the ATO.

In August, scammers impersonating National Broadband Network (NBN) staff were cold-calling

unsuspecting consumers and conning them into handing over sensitive personal identification details.

So, how can you tell if a phone call might be a scam?

Ms Rickard says there are a few ways you can tell you might be on the phone with a scammer, including:

- "Microsoft, Telstra, etc. are not remotely checking your computers unless you have been in contact."
- If they claim to be from a computer software company wanting access to your computer.
- If the overall quality of the call is poor
- Calls made on behalf of government agencies asking for bills to be paid in the form of prepaid gift cards — such as iTunes
- If the caller is **applying inappropriate pressure** including threats and potentially inappropriate language, as part of their scam
- Any calls asking for financial details (such as credit card or banking details)

Telstra has also warned its customers on its website to avoid callers that claim to be from the Australian Federal Police, wanting you to help them "track down criminals".

"In these calls you're often asked to transfer money abroad using international wire transfer services," the telco said.

What should you do?

It might seem obvious, but Ms Rickard says the best thing you can do to protect yourself during a dodgy call is **HANG UP**.

Otherwise, the ACCC recommends the following options:

- Don't respond to numbers supplied in an automated call or from numbers you don't recognise
- Always be sceptical and if you're unsure the person on the end of the phone is not who they say they are, hang up and call the organisation directly on an independently verified number
- Don't give someone who calls you out of the blue any money, personal details or access to your computer
- Don't return calls to international numbers unless you know them
- Don't pay with an iTunes gift card. No legitimate business in Australia is going to be asked to be paid this way
- Delete any messages left on your voicemail Speak to someone you trust about the scam call If you do think you've been scammed, it's unlikely you'll get your money back.

However, there are some ways you can limit your losses — including contacting your financial institutions, reporting the scam to authorities, changing your computer password or attempting to recover your stolen identity.

How does the scam work?

The scammers are quite sophisticated in the techniques they use to con people out of money, often pretending to be from an organisation that intimidates people. *(continued on next page)*

"Talking to people who have been scammed, people are very nervous of Centrelink, they're terrified of any impact on their pension or whatever it is and they tend to do unquestioningly what they are told," Ms Rickard said.

In some cases, the scammer will try to convince someone they've done something wrong, and then demand payment as part of a solution to the problem.

But in the case of the wangiri scam, the scammers make money by using companies that sell premium numbers, allowing purchasers to work out how much they want to charge people calling them back.

That means callers who ring the international number back will be calling a premium service — meaning the telephone provider will be charged at a normal rate as well as whatever the scammer determines that call is worth — with some of the money also going to the premium number provider. In this case, the wangiri scammers want the caller to stay on the line as long as possible, thereby increasing the amount of money they make. If people I know have been targeted, does that mean I'm next? Not necessarily, some of it is a result of scammers using an automated system, which allows them to call random phone number combinations.

"But, it could come through multiple ways," she says.

"We know on the dark web all sorts of lists are sold, including people who have ever shown any interest in scams and so are more susceptible to these things," Ms Rickard said.

"When you go online and put your name in competitions, surveys that are doing the rounds on social media, sometimes they are put up by people who sell this information onto scammers."

Property renovations that are not worth your time and effort

Reality television has made property renovation more popular than ever and with some extra time on your hands in retirement, home improvement is always an attractive proposition.

Many retirees take the option to give their home a makeover with the ultimate goal of improving their property value when the time comes to downsize.

There are a number of renovation traps which can end up costing you more money than you will earn.

Making impulse purchases

Sticking to your renovation budget requires applying the same rules as any other shopping budget: you have to avoid impulse buying. Other impulse choices like making design changes once you have accepted a quote from your tradesman can also prove expensive. Try not to spend too much money on frivolous fittings.

Replacing instead of repairing

If you have a period property, a lot of unnecessary work can be prevented by adopting a 'repair not replace' approach. Overhauling original doors and windows and retaining period features is often cheaper than replacement, adding value in the process by enhancing character. In many cases, the original door and window timbers and joinery were of far better quality than today's equivalents.

Being too cheap with materials

Buying materials that are incredibly cheap is usually a false economy. For a start, anything obviously 'cheap and nasty' is likely to detract from the value of your renovation. Quality can be difficult to determine from blurry online product photos, so it is always better if you are able to see the materials you would like to purchase in person.

Improving the wrong areas

Some renovation options may make your living experience in the property much nicer, but they

won't add a lot to your eventual sale value. Electrical work and plumbing are two prime examples. If these repairs are required to get your property back to being fully functional, you should still proceed, but do not expect them to add much value to your property when the time comes to sell.

Overcapitalising your renovation

Adding high-end finishes to a low-value property can result in spending more money than can ever be made when selling. Landscaping is a massive trap in this regard, with many expensive options available that will increase the attractiveness of your property but will rarely translate into rewards on the market.
